As of August 2nd, we are almost there with full crews for both setup and move out, but we are

still short six volunteers for running trains.

This year we will run trains from 9am-9pm daily starting Sunday, September 22 until 9pm Saturday, September 28. Setup will start at 8am on Saturday September 21 with pack up starting at 8am Sunday 9/29. Operating shifts run from 9am-3pm and 3pm-9pm with two members on each shift for a total of 28 slots.

EVENT REPORTS



Orange here, Orange there, Orange everywhere! By Art Shean

Saturday July 13, 2024, the Maine 3 Railers Outreach Team unveiled a

10.5' by 30' model train display for the 2024 Moxie Festival crowd. The layout included four independent track loops and two elevated trolley lines using over 190 feet of Lionel FasTrack. The outer loop alone used nearly 89 feet of track.



With thousands of visitors expected to visit the Moxie Festival, the team tried their best to impress with lights, sounds, and action on one of our larger layouts to stimulate public interest in our hobby, especially among younger kids.

Friday evening before the festival the team of Paul Brown, Sam Carr, Art Shean, and Carlton Spring unloaded their SUVs and a box trailer shortly after 5pm at the Marion T. Morse (MTM) Community Center, in Lisbon Falls. We started late in the afternoon because the MTM Gym where we set up, is used by the Lisbon Recreation Day Camp. When the last camper left, we unloaded and began assembly. With everything unloaded, we placed the tables, and our layout soon took shape.



Setup went smoothly with the small but highly experienced crew.






After neatly storing our boxes, we left for the night ready for the expected crowds on Saturday morning.



Our symmetrical layout was long and lean with loops on either end for the kids to run Thomas engines.



The final product looked as follows:



As in previous years, we also offered the kids the opportunity to win a Tootsie Pop by finding nine Disney characters displayed around the layout.





Unlike other Club model train events, the Moxie Festival is an **Odd Duck**. When we visit senior living, library, hospital, and veterans' venues we are the main attraction. When we participate in model train shows we are a featured attraction to help draw guest attendance. But at the Moxie Festival, we have become a staple like rice and potatoes. Visitors expected to see us in the MTM Community Center as usual but didn't come just for us. We are one of multiple side shows that enrich the Moxie Festival experience.

With so many activities planned, visitors needed an event schedule to keep up. We operated on Saturday from 8am to 4pm. With the MTM Community Center centrally located, we were frequently asked where this event and that event were located and at what time. Fortunately, we had a festival poster located inside the center for reference but having a detailed schedule of events would be a useful addition in future years. Besides running trains, we also supported the greater good by serving as a branch of Guest Services.



Come one, come all! See the mighty steel engines prance around their steel tracks for your amusement and delight! Oh, and by the way you can visit the restroom while you are here.

On Saturday morning, trains rolled in the MTM at 8am with a few kids returning from previous years to run trains.



From experience we expected the crowd to be sparse through

the early morning with the Moxie Fun Runs starting at 7am and the parade scheduled for midmorning. However, the last few years the parade started at 9am while this year it started at 10am. The festival also boasts that the Moxie parade is the longest in the State of Maine and it lived up to their boasts. Around 11am we began to become concerned that the heat and humidity may have subdued the crowd size.

Frequently during the morning, I checked outside for the crowd but other than vendors and exhibitors manning their booths there were relatively few visitors. Finally, around quarter after eleven in exasperation I checked one last time. To my amazement, I saw a wave of people walking along the road from the parade route toward the MTM Center. Yes, the Moxie Festival Parade is truly the longest parade in Maine and the dam had just broken.



The crowd surged into the Center with orange everywhere and orange tin cans of Moxie in hand.







Per Doug Pollock, our official head counter and Tootsie Pop dispensor, we had over 600 visitors view the layout and gave away close to 170 Tootsie Pops to scavenger hunt winners. And his count did not include visitors passing by to visit the rest rooms and MTM Center offices. Considering the competition from the many other festival activities, the count was quite rewarding.

Speaking of competition, at 1pm Julia Gagnon from 2024 "American Idol" fame performed at the back of the MTM Center on the Pavilion. Julia is a product of North Yarmouth Academy and finished in the top 10 of the American Idol 2024 competition. As you can imagine, the number of layout viewers dropped dramatically and inquiries as to where the MTM Center Pavilion was located increased. During the Iull, we grabbed a few photos of her performance.





During the slow morning, we noticed a mysterious blank screen outside the MTM. It was white and measured 8' tall by 16' wide. At first I thought they might be showing a movie later in the evening but that thought soon faded into reality. A pickup truck was behind the screen with a banner draped along its side.





Then it became clear that the white board was a canvas for a mural honoring the star of the Moxie Festival: **MOXIE!**

Jared Goulette a.k.a. The Color Wizard created a similar size mural during the 2023 Moxie Festival which now hangs in the MTM Community Center gym. His bright colors and fine detail highlight cool refreshing enjoyment derived from drinking Moxie.





This year we were fortunate enough to catch Jared before he began this Festival's offering. Turns out that this year's mural included even more detail. We caught him apply the first spray and followed him throughout the day. On Sunday they moved the unfinished mural to a local park where the Festival continued. MODEL RAILROADING



The Never Ending Story by Jan Williams

Editor's Note: With Jan it is true, a model train layout is never finished! I've been busy on the layout since completing the Grand Hotel, primarily in upgrading the Hotel and Station Plaza. The below picture shows the area 15 years ago; the walls of the plaza are simply plywood painted red. This project primarily involved

painting Plastruct embossed plastic sheets and applying them to the existing walls.



The following three photos show the walls today, with the hotel in place. Remaining to-dos include a couple of retaining walls, and some signage for the hotel.



The brick arches on the viaduct were relatively easy. After cutting the sheets to fit, I spray painted them with hardware store flat red primer. I then hand painted a selection of bricks in other red colors; bricks are almost uniform in color but some change color in the manufacturing process. A thin wash of white paint then added mortar to the walls. I used spray adhesive to add the brick sheets to the existing foam board structure.

The random stone retaining walls were a more interesting challenge. When I ordered them from Plastruct I didn't pay attention to how small are the stones. The wall involves six panels, each about 6 X 12 inches. I calculated that each panel contains about 1800 stones... First step was to spray paint each sheet with black primer.

Yup, I painted each stone, using my people painting brushes. Natural stones in a wall really do vary in color. Did you know that Golden acrylic artist colors offer eight different shades of medium gray? I have all of them and used everyone! The below photo shows a sheet in the early stages of painting.



This stuff can make you crazy...

I finally finished painting stone walls for a while! For the walls facing the harbor, I decided to use shades of brown and yellow rather than the grays I used on previous walls. I finished with my usual thin black wash. I think the yellow toned walls are fine, have a brighter, more cheerful look than the gray walls. And they seem to hold up the hotel and station just as well...





This hobby is a great stress reliever from my corporate commitments as a Board member! I'm taking a deep breath, getting ready to build the model of the Portland train terminal formerly on St Johns Street. All the dimensional research went into building the foam board mockup 15 years ago. Of course it's compressed, but all the key features are there. The challenges now are how to build this thing in miniature... there are quite a few... LOL, Cheers!



RUST by Ken Thorson

THIS IS RUST!



THIS IS RUST IN THE WRONG PLACE!



So, what are you going to do about it? Good question! First, don't store your precious trains in a damp place. If there is any chance that moisture will creep into your storage area, get a space dehumidifier adequate to manage the square area of the space. Moisture is not limited to standing water. Humidity exceeding 80% can breed rust and, once it is on your train, rust removal will almost certainly alter the luster of unpainted metal often leaving it with a mottled look. Bad luck that may affect appearance and conductivity of wheels!

Second, don't store your trains in a permeable container (think cardboard) directly on a concrete floor that is resting on the earth as in a basement. If your dwelling's foundation walls and footing are not well drained, moisture can pass through the concrete and infuse anything in direct contact. This will be more likely if we experience heavy rains or it rains for days and days. If possible, place them on pallets. If not pallets, create airspace under the container with 2x4's or something similar.

Third, the longer your trains remain hidden away, the more likely unseen rust damage will take hold and create heartache with your trains. The longer metal components are exposed to humid air, the faster they will corrode. The simple practice of rotating the trains you run will help to mitigate the risk of rusting and help you detect rust before it becomes more serious.

Fourth, use the desiccants inside the manufacturer's box that the train came in when you store your trains in those boxes, or any container that trains may be stored in if you no longer have the original box. What are desiccants? Those are the small packages (usually white with "Do Not Eat" printed on them) of moisture-absorbing silica gel beads that came in inside the manufacturer's box that are often cast aside when the box is first opened. They are there for a purpose: to protect your investment. Don't throw them away. Leave them in the box.

Fifth, for all those boxes where the desiccant is lost, you should replace the missing desiccant with a new one. This is also true if the desiccant is old (3 years is a commonly mentioned benchmark) because they lose their effectiveness as they absorb moisture. Some desiccants may have color-coded beads that turn color when they are spent. Some desiccants can be "recharged" by oven or microwave heat that drives off the accumulated moisture (they rarely feel actually wet to the touch). Not all desiccant packages are rechargeable. When you buy replacement packages, the product description will indicate whether they are rechargeable. So how do you recharge them? On a tray in an oven set at 200-250F for ½-2 hrs. Or, in the microwave on a plate using defrost function for 7-12 minutes (assuming a typical 1100W to 1200W counter-top microwave oven).

Sixth, how do you know what and where to purchase? A 5oz packet (2.2 in. x 1.8 in.) is suitable for the purpose. I recommend using two such packets for each storage box. I purchased the packets in quantity. You can buy them wherever you find them. Here is a link to the product I purchased. Amazon.com: Silica Gel Packets, 50PCS 5 Gram Premium Transparent Desiccant Packs for Storage, Moisture Absorbers for Control Absorbing, Desiccant Dehumidifiers Bags for Electronics, Clothes Shoes, Jewelry, Spices : Health & Household The Amazon price is \$5.99 for 50, 5oz packets (there is a 9% discount if you buy 2 or more).

Finally, your trains are an investment worth preserving and protecting. Nothing kills value like rust. Don't take a chance. Desiccant packs are inexpensive insurance against rust.



A Few Side Notes from Jan by Jan Williams Menards Plug and Play

I recently sorted through my storage shelves and found some Menards plug and play vehicles, and a power supply. These things are a hoot! Just takes a half inch hole in your layout for the plug...

Unruly Trees

On occasion I buy a bunch of commercially made trees, whenever the big suppliers run an attractive sale. They usually sit for many months until the mood strikes and I have a 'tree day'. A tree day happened last week...

Many of us, on our pikes, plant a solitary tree next to a house or in a garden. That is a normal suburban scene, planned and manicured. That is not the way trees in a forest look...

In the wild trees are an aggressive and unfriendly bunch. They try to crowd each other out, and race towards the sun so they can put their competitors in shade. Trees in the wild look like a solid mass of green -





differences in shapes, species, and shades of green tend to be subtle.

I'm trying to achieve that look in a few spots on my pike. It takes a lot of trees! I'm making progress, not there yet...

Lionel SD40-E Clearance Issues by Jan Williams

I recently took delivery of a new Lionel SD40-E locomotive. This is a new design, with a spring loaded pilot assembly that lets the front end stay aligned with the loco body as it traverses curves. My loco had a snowplow with very little track clearance.

I was surprised to find that the snowplow was snagging guard rails in my Ross switches. By snagging I mean stopping it cold. I also found that the plow was snagging switch machines. A

fascinating design gaffe by Lionel - the online world has confirmed a variety of clearance issues with this design.

My solution was to grind off about 1/8 inch from the bottom of the plow. A coarse carbide grinder in my Dremel did the job quickly. I've since painted the area, nothing is visible.

The Lionel SD40-E is now happy hauling 14 car freights around my layout - with two drive motors this thing is a beast!



Potential purchasers of larger Lionel locomotives should carefully evaluate this new design. The locomotives have significant overhang on curves!

5 Ways to Engage Kids with Toy Trains

I've had a lifelong fascination with trains, stemming from my father's nearly 40-year career on the Santa Fe (and later BNSF) railroad. Some of my fondest childhood memories included trips to the train depot in Fort Madison, Iowa where I would see freight trains come and go. When I was 8 years old, I'll never forget coming home from school one day to see Dad in our basement, setting up what would become our HO scale train layout.

Fast forward to early 2018, when my interest in the hobby was reborn. My oldest son (then 2 years old) had received the best Christmas gift from Santa Claus: a Lionel *Polar Express* train set. This led to my exploration into O gauge accessories. We built a layout, added locomotives and accessories, and connected with other modelers in our area and on social media.

Many of us talk about the future of toy trains and how much the next generation may be interested in pursuing it. I do not claim to be an expert, as many of you are parents and grandparents who already do an incredible job of involving children with toy trains. However, I'd like to share a few ways of involving kids in toy trains that have not only worked with my three young sons, but ideas from other hobbyists as well (including the "Train Dads," see sidebar below).

Give children a chance to operate the layout

I have had so much joy as a parent seeing my sons control our layout. Does this mean that I let them run my Lionel Legacy locomotives unsupervised? Nope. However, I'll never forget the huge smile on my 4-year-old's face when he controlled a Legacy 2-8-0 Consolidation steam locomotive for the first time with the LionChief app on our iPad. As he hit the whistle button and saw the whistle steam feature activated on the engine, he felt as if he were in the cab in the engineer's seat! Along with the LionChief app, my children enjoy the simplicity of the Lionel remotes, whether that be a Universal Remote or individual remotes that accompany train sets or older LionChief Plus locomotives.

Do a project together



Observing the creativity of my children has been enriching. They have ideas for new locations of buildings, scenery, die-cast cars and trucks, figurines, you name it! While trips to our local hobby shop may include their pleading to purchase every new O gauge item on the shelf, it's fun to see them think out loud about what a new package of trees or foliage would look like on the layout, or perhaps some new cars for our auto racks. Two recent projects have included gluing cow figures into our cattle cars and weathering boxcars with chalk. The weathering idea really caught on with my 4 year old, and he took it upon himself to weather a gondola car in his collection of wooden trains!

Take family trips to a railroad museum

Living in eastern lowa, we are fortunate to be within driving distance of incredible railroad museums and historic sites. While visiting family in that area, we've traveled to the Boone & Scenic Valley Railroad and the James H. Andrew Museum in Boone, Iowa, as well as the McCormick-Stillman Railroad Park in Scottsdale, Ariz.

During the past two summers, my wife and I have taken our sons to the Illinois Railroad Museum in Union, Ill. during their "Day Out with Thomas" excursions. It is heartwarming for us to see our children's excitement when they see Thomas and Percy chugging down the tracks! Their interest in the permanent collection of equipment is thrilling for them as well. Walking alongside these giants is an incredible experience for them at such a young age.

Speaking of locomotive giants, we were fortunate that Union Pacific "Big Boy" No. 4014 came through our region in summer 2019. At that time, our oldest was almost 4 years old, and our second child was just a couple of weeks old (our third child would arrive two years later). "Big Boy" headed eastbound from the Chicago area on the morning of a July day, and the locomotive and consist made a stop in Wheatland, Iowa, later traveling to Cedar Rapids and Des Moines. Seeing the world's largest operating steam locomotive was an extraordinary experience. We're looking forward to more special trains and excursions as they come close to our home,

notably the upcoming CPKC Steam Tour featuring the "Empress" No. 2816 4-6-4 Hudson steam locomotive and the CPKC Holiday Train in November/December.

Set up a Christmas tree display

For many of us, this is how our fascination with the hobby got started. A great way to keep children's interest in toy trains is to set up a holiday layout around the Christmas tree, whether it be a simple loop or a large Christmas village. In our home, setting up the *Polar Express* around our Christmas tree has become as much of a tradition as hanging up our stockings, watching holiday movies, or leaving milk and cookies for Santa.



Keeping our children involved with the hobby can start with rewarding experiences and projects on the family train layout, taking a trip to the local hobby store or train show to select the next locomotive together, or by simply standing near the railroad tracks and seeing a friendly exchange of waves between the locomotive engineers and our kids. Isn't this an incredible hobby? Happy railroading!

Meet the Train Dads

A few years ago, I connected with a few model railroaders on social media. The five of us -Michael McNamee, Chris Raines, Nicholas Tate, Matt Rotchford, and I - all have two things in common: We have O gauge layouts and we're all fathers.
