




Five trains were running through the "Maine Woods" scenery created during the pandemic by host Jeff Jacobs and Brian Inch of Model Railscenes.

Planes, Trains, and Monster Trucks by Art Shean

But for four days a year, the walk-in basement of Ray and Robins Hobby Center in West Falmouth is dedicated to Radio Controlled (RC) monster truck racing.











In the four days not consumed by truck racing, the Maine 3 Railers set up our holiday model train display, run trains for two days, then vanish for the remainder of the year. And so, it was in 2024 from December 13th through the 16th.

Friday morning, December 13th, Sam Carr and Carlton Spring joined up at the L.L. Bean model holiday train village to complete the daily track cleaning and engine lubrication duties. After which they stopped for a leisurely breakfast enroute to Ray and Robins Hobby Center to set up this year's

holiday model train display. Per Club tradition they arrived before the designated meeting time, unloaded their equipment, and began arranging the available R&R tables. They were soon joined by John Ash who ferried in from Chebeague Island. When I arrived at the designated time, I was already late and set up was underway. John, Sam, and Carlton greeted me in the parking lot and had my trailer emptied in short order.










Thankfully, Ray Labonte and his store crew had prepared the store and basement well ahead of our visit and the venue was ready for us to start set up as soon as we arrived.












Unpacking and layout assembly went smoothly on the nine tables provided by R&R. The 171 square foot 10'x20' display boasted three loops, two trolley lines, and a turnout terminating in a engine house. Rather than a simple loop, the main outer rail line was shaped like a horse saddlebag with a raised outdoor winter playland on top where a rider would normally sit.



Overall the crew laid 136 feet of FasTrak, paved 56 plus feet of 6" wide asphault roads, and placed 64 buildings, carnival rides, and accessories.





Beside the winter playland, the layout included from left to right a rural town, holiday shopping zone, and a winter carnival with multiple never before displayed on an M3R layout rides.









Doug Pollock joined the crew on Saturday to help meet and greet with guests and Frank Folker provided a helpful set of hands for the teardown Monday morning.

As a retired airline pilot, Ray Labonte has a passion for model aircraft and it shows in the array of model planes adoring the ceiling of his hobby shop. So while the trains ran in his basement, the planes flew high overhead in the shop above. And quite the collection it is.

Side Notes:

Among the store customers, Jeff Jacobs, Fred Guth, and Fred's wife visited us on Saturday.



We did have one tenuous moment when we arrived on Saturday morning. We discovered that a train load of passengers was left upside down on one of the winter carnival rides all night. Good thing we were not called in the middle of the night to rescue them.



During a conversation with Ray Labonte, we mentioned that we displayed multiple 3D printed items in our L.L. Bean Holiday layout this year. To which he pulled out an example of his own 3D printing – a 12" formula one racer with compartment for an electric motor.



On Sunday, a R&R crew member with a returned HO train set joined us in the basement. A customer had purchased the set for his son but having buyer's remorse wanted to upgrade to an O-scale version.



Lastly, on Sunday we experienced multiple examples of trains unexplainably stopping on the saddlebag loop between the turnout and the raised platform. After extensive investigation we discovered the fault was the result of two issues: on the far side of the table, we had a loose joint that intermittently disconnected the track segment from the power terminal. The compounding discovery was the switch track for the siding on the other end of the track segment did not provide power continuity for the leg that linked with the main line. As a result, we inadvertently created an isolated track segment. The field solution was replacing the track with the lose joint and the switch

track with a curved track section. Problem resolved for the remainder of our run. The long-term solution is to solder the connections inside the switch track that provide power connectivity between the track entrance and exits.



Monday morning the crew consisting of Sam Carr, Frank Folker, Art Shean, and Carlton Spring arrived at 10am when the center opened and dismantled, packed, and moved out so that the RC monster trucks could resume their racing.

On December 15th Bill Halley hosted a Model Train Open House, where visitors had the opportunity to explore the fascinating world of miniature railroads, intricate landscapes, and expertly crafted train models. Visitors explored diverse tracks, tunnels, bridges, and stations, all set in beautifully crafted landscapes.

Several volunteers had live demonstrations where visitors got to watch the trains and accessories in full action. We all watched how the trains navigated complex routes and learned about the technology behind it. Bill showcased



classic steam engines and modern high-speed trains. He has a wide variety on display. Bill was excited to share his passion for trains and model railroading with all attendees.

The ALBOE was started during the latter part of 2016 and continues to be an ongoing project that may never be finished. The track and switches are manufactured by Gargrave's trackage

corporation based in NY. The track and switches have operated without fail since being installed. Most switches are manually controlled.

Bill enjoys following the trains around the layout, rather than operating from a fixed position. Much of the motive power is manufactured and controlled by MTH and the MTH DCS system. Bill prefers the DCS system as it allows him to operate several brands of locomotives.

Whether you're a long-time enthusiast or brand new to the hobby, there was something for everyone. Thank you to all that visited *The ALBOE Central Model Railroad!*

Another Holiday Season has concluded at the L.L. Bean flagship store train display in Freeport.

Here are some details:

- Work began Oct 14th at Jeff's West Bath workshop.
- We moved to the store to resume construction on Nov 5th.
- The display opened to the public on Nov 22nd as LLB kicked off their Northern lights 2024 event.
- Thirty-one M3R volunteers helped build and maintain the 8' x 16' layout which was different than prior years. This season we had just 2 loops of FasTrak, but the curves were larger and the track plan more interesting.



This year Mark Lasher introduced us to the world of 3D printing with many intricate figures added to the diorama. My favorite was a scale snowblower, but the moose and dog sleds were popular, and the snowmobiles added a sense of a Maine outdoor winter.









Technical challenges included using two throttles on the "over & under" loop so that the conventional engines without electronic speed control could be adjusted with a 'climbing' speed and a 'descending' speed.

Thank you to the thirty one M3R members that helped build, transport, cleaned the tracks and/or made sure the trains stayed on the rails. The center of the display was the large L.L. Bean store model,









and after a heart-stopping search, two favorite Jan Williams creations (Freeport Train Depot and Bangor 1897 Firehouse) were added. Jan also added the Freeport Fire Hose Drying Tower this year.

The action skating rinks were again popular and for those who looked carefully, a curling match was taking place in the park.





Tongue in cheek humor was subtle once more as we added Derosiers Market to the model village. This local lunch stand was a favorite Freeport spot for M3R members working on the project.

The Polar Express was the featured train with 3 different engines taking turns pulling the crowd pleasing consist.

2024 L.L. Bean Northern Lights Holiday Model Train Village Moveout by Jeff Jacobs

Thursday January 2nd, 2025, Freeport Maine: Today things concluded at the Freeport store with ten club members dismantling and packing the display which ran there for seven weeks. We began our work promptly at 9am and just after noon had three trucks loaded with

the platforms and two SUVs loaded with everything else.

Several days earlier, Sam Carr picked up our boxes at Doug Pollock's where they were stored during the duration of our display. The night before after 9 pm, Ken Thorson retrieved our trees, people, and most of the vehicles to avoid impeding the rapid disassembly process in the morning.

Bernie Pender, Jim Kinnie, Ken Thorson, and I worked inside the rails removing and passing the track, engines, rolling stock, controls, wiring, buildings, and accessories to the packing crew outside the railed fence. When the tables were clear I took my Sabre saw and separated the tables for transport.

















Although everything went smoothly, we did have one moment of drama as we carefully removed the L.L. Bean building from the table and Jim Kinnie placed it back into its display case. We all held our breath during the move.

As they were passed over the fence, the rest of the crew carefully packed, identified, and added them to an inventory list which Bernie Pender now has. Walt Voskian did a Yeomans job as our scribe during this evolution. We hope this procedure will ensure control of our valued train treasures for future uses.















When the tables were clear and separated, the crew manhandled them out of the display area onto three pickup trucks. The move required rotating each table on edge to fit through the doors.







After loading the trucks, Jim Kinnie, Bernie Pender, and I left L.L. Bean for Hiram to store the layout modules and roll out table at Jan Williams' barn. Jan Williams met us in Hiram and assisted us there.

Meanwhile, the rest of the crew loaded the packed boxes of smaller items (rolling stock, buildings, etc) into two SUVs and departed for Topsham. Sam Carr, Art Shean and Ken Thorson unloaded the L.L. Half-Height Ladders on Modern Boxcars? What's the Deal? By Ken Thorson

Older boxcars such as Pullman Standard 1 have ladders all the way to the roof at the corner (see MEC below).





MEC with full height corner ladder See: roof walk hangover at end center

BAR with half height corner ladder See: no roof walk

You may have noticed that some models of modern boxcars have ladders on the sides that only rise about one-half way up the height of the boxcar (see BAR above). What happened to the rest of the ladder?

In the past, road and yard employees, usually brakemen, would move from car to car using the roof walks along the centerline of the roof. To access the roof walk, workers needed the ladder all the way to the top. Walking or running the roof walk was a dangerous practice resulting in frequent worker injuries. American railroads began phasing out roof walks (also known as running boards) on boxcars in the late 1960s, primarily due to safety concerns and regulatory changes. The key regulatory event was the adoption of Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) regulations in 1966, which prohibited the use of roof walks on newly built freight cars and required the removal of roof walks from existing cars over time.

In addition to injuries from falls and awkward landings, there was extreme danger that distracted employees would not realize the car they were riding would pass into a tunnel, under a signal bridge, or under a passenger or auto bridge for which the limited clearance would not allow a standing person to pass. To alert workers to such danger, railroads created telltales. Railroad telltales are trackside fixtures that warn brakemen who might be walking on top of a car that a tunnel, overpass, signal bridge, or other low-clearance situation is coming up. They consist of a series of ropes hanging from a support span or cable over the tracks. If a brakeman met the ropes, he was made aware of an obstruction ahead and could take precautions to avoid injury. The half height ladders are retained to permit brakemen and others to climb aboard for temporary, short-term rides to the next worksite.
