

Club Cars: Here is a summary of the cars which the Maine 3 Railers club currently have for sale. See our Club web page for special pricing offers:

First, is the summer car from our "Seasons in Maine" series. The attractive light blue cylindrical hopper shows activity in Portland Harbor as well as the blue & gold BAR RR herald. The car is an MTH Railking model and is available in two road numbers.

Second, we have the 2023 offering which is an MTH Premier product. This car is a high quality flat with M3R printed on it and a Hannaford trailer riding atop it. There are 2 road numbers available. This car is a very versatile item which could also transport vehicles, bulky objects or boats (as in lobster). The quality and usefulness of this club car makes it worth purchasing.

Last, we come to the 2018 CIANBRO cars. These also are available in multiple road numbers and two colors. Again, they are quality Premier cars from MTH and have lots of practical alternative applications. I had one repainted in green and loaded it with Christmas packages for the 2024 LL Bean display. It brought many compliments. Further each car contains a bridge girder which is easily removed via 4 screws. You will find the metal girders to be substantial and a pair of them would make a







quality bridge on your layout. On some cars the girder is labeled "Maine Central" while on the others we find "Bangor & Aroostook". Pick up a couple of matching cars and get creative with a rugged bridge and two useful gondolas which can carry any load.





The View from Doug's Chair by Doug Pollock

Southern Maine Model Railroad Club Train Show in Westbrook: **As usual our layout was very good**. We set up late in the afternoon the day before. Saturday morning Art and I arrived around 8am and I set up the HONOR GUARDS.





Something new this time: I added a police officer and fireman with an American Flag to the grouping. After that we put out the trees and vehicles and were ready to roll.

It was a lousy snowy day and there were not to many people.



At around 10 it started to pick up. A dad with his daughter on his shoulders came around our tables. She had a fire hat on, and they spent a long time looking at everything. They left but came back multiple times. A family from Ohio came by. The mom was pregnant, and her father had her daughter on the other side of table having fun watching the trains. The mom on other side had the BIGGEST SMILE on her face watching her dad and her daughter's enjoyment. Two other guys came up to our table, looked around, and told me, "Pretty Awesome!", smiled, and



walked off. A young couple with a very young daughter stopped by and were very interested in our layout. All in all, a very good day!

Sad Day: On a rainy Tuesday, April 22nd at 10 o clock we laid our comrade, Fred Guth, to rest in the Veterans Cemetery in Augusta with about 30-40 folks in attendance. He will be Missed and Remembered Forever!

Pullman Brown:

A retired UPS employee told me the color of UPS trucks is Pullman Brown. The Pullman company painted their vehicles that color for a long time, but they used to be painted Pullman Green. The familiar green color and its variable (also known as Federal Mailbox Green) came into use during the Robert Todd Lincoln administration of the Pullman Company. In the "Wood" era their cars were painted in the deep brown you see on UPS vehicles today.

Anyone ever notice that pullman green is very close to the olive drab color military vehicles and equipment use to be painted? Olive drab was some tough paint. It probably influenced R T Lincolns decision to use it. It was in use by the Army at least as far back as the 19th Century and Lincoln was Secretary of War at the time.

UPS is one of the most popular brands in America, and easily recognizable thanks largely in part to the company's primary color – brown. It's a color we've grown accustomed to seeing on the company's delivery trucks, drivers, and semis, and anything else with UPS's branding.

But brown wasn't always the color you'd see on a UPS truck.



It all started 115 years ago when UPS was started in Seattle by two teenagers, Claude Ryan and Jim Casey. Then, the company was first known as the American Messenger Company.

Six years later in 1913, the American Messenger Company had its first package car, which was red with a black Ford chassis. When it came time for a second package car, "the company was advised to paint it a more conspicuous color," according to information about UPS's history.

For the second car, the American Messenger Company used yellow. It wasn't until 1916 that things changed.

Charlie Soderstrom, a UPS founder, started overseeing the company's automotive fleet. He didn't want to use yellow because he felt it was too conspicuous and impacted on the advertising value of the stores they delivered for. Instead, Soderstrom thought the stores would prefer a more conservative color.

A popular choice in the early 1900s was black but it required too much upkeep. Ultimately, Soderstrom and the company landed on brown after being inspired by the Pullman Company and its sleeping compartment railroad cars, which were symbols of "style and elegance and first-class travel" at the time.

The Pullman Company - which was at one point overseen by Robert Todd Lincoln, son of President Abraham Lincoln - was well-known for its luxurious and comfortable railcars. A brown Pullman Company car can be seen below:

In 1919, when the company expanded to Oakland, California, it debuted the two features we've come to know: the name 'United Parcel Service' and brown company cars. Six years later, the drivers would get matching brown uniforms.

Eight decades later, in 1998, 'UPS Brown' became a trademarked color. UPS became the third company to have a color trademarked in the U.S. (Owens Corning was first, registering pink, followed by Qualitex, which registered a green-blue). Other companies like Tiffany and T-Mobile have since trademarked their colors.

I found this information on the web when I searched under "Pullman Brown".

Railroad Superstition:

The Wreck at the Tin Bridge by Jeff Jacobs

The Tin Bridge on Main Street in Bangor (so named for the tin roof over the wooden bridge) was constructed by the Maine Central Railroad around 1853 to cross over the public road near the Hampden town line. One summer at about 7:30 in the evening in 1871, a six-

car train began to cross the Tin Bridge when disaster struck. Two men were killed and 44 passengers injured as the train tumbled from the collapsing bridge.

Historically, tracks of the Maine Central and the Bangor & Aroostook met at Northern Maine Junction in Hermon. The MEC tracks extended from there to downtown Bangor by a short route which passed over Bangor's Main Street.




Today a steel girder bridge serves the purpose as shown in this recent Google photo



The 1853 bridge was a timber affair with the tin roof sheathing intended to protect the wood from rain and snow, but by 1871 (just 18 years) dry rot had so damaged the wood that it collapsed under the weight of the passenger/mail train.

A brakeman and a passenger died when the Bangor Express tumbled off the defective bridge at lower Main Street near the location of the landmark Webber Oil Co. The result was massive and sudden.



In the lower left of the above photo, you can see a truss having fallen completely to the road below. All but one of the coaches plunged into the opening.







Two thousand assembled that evening to view the wreck with approximately 10,000 spectators the following day.

The MEC investigation concluded that rotten bridge timbers were the root cause of this tragic August 9 accident at the "Tin Bridge". Other contributing factors were increased speed as the engineer attempted to make a closing 'time window' to pass over the bridge and braking by the brakeman which caused the train to lurch while it was on the bridge.

Since I grew up in the Bangor area and heard tales of the spectacular wreck, I decided to create a diorama of the event. A few years ago, at the M3R annual show at the Elks Club, I presented a 2' x 8' scene of the demolished Tin Bridge and the jumbled trains complete with a wrecking crane attempting to unsnarl the carnage. The O scale model generated a lot of interest in this horrific piece of Maine railroad history.
