LATE BREAKING NEWS From Our President:

At the Thursday night Monthly Club meeting, June 12th, we plan to discuss club donations and will be requesting your input as to recipients on the list below or others you would like to recommend.

Please come prepared by reading the following:

In keeping with our 501(c)(3) charitable organization status, and with the Executive Board's proposal to donate approximately 5% of cash assets in 2025 to organizations doing exemplary work in Maine, here is a list of potential recipients that align with our mission of furthering interest in the model train hobby.

This list is divided into two categories: "Community Services" and "Model Train relevant Organizations." Some organizations may naturally bridge both areas. Please note that further due diligence will be essential to ensure each organization meets our specific criteria for "exemplary work" and aligns precisely with our charitable goals.

Potential Donation Recipients in Maine:

1) Community Services:

These organizations provide vital support and programs to Maine communities. While their primary mission may not be trains, your donation could support general operations or specific programs that might, for instance, offer youth activities where an interest in trains could be fostered (e.g., through educational materials, outreach, field trips).

Travis Mills Foundation:

Focus: Supports post-9/11 recalibrated veterans and their families. They provide an all-inclusive, all-expenses-paid, barrier-free retreat in Maine, offering adaptive activities, family bonding, and much-needed rest and relaxation.

Impact: Directly serves veterans who have sustained significant injuries in service, helping them and their families navigate rehabilitation and find a "new normal." Their work is very hands-on and provides a unique sanctuary.

Relevance to our mission: While not directly related to trains, supporting veterans who have sacrificed for our country aligns with broader community service and well-being. This donation would certainly be seen as an impactful contribution to the community.

Good Shepherd Food Bank and other Food Banks:

Focus: Good Shepherd Food Bank is Maine's largest hunger relief organization, distributing food to over 400 non-profit partners across the state. They also have programs focused on cooking education, local food sourcing, and advocacy.

Impact: Addresses a fundamental need by providing access to nutritious food for thousands of Mainers facing hunger, including children and families. Their network extends statewide, offering broad reach.

Relevance to our mission: Directly impacts community well-being and addresses food insecurity, a critical issue for many communities.

Mid-Coast Hunger Prevention Program (MCHPP):

Focus: The largest hunger relief and prevention agency in the Midcoast region of Maine. They operate a soup kitchen, food bank, and food pantry, along with satellite pantries in schools and community centers. They also have a new "Community Kitchen" to support local food systems.

Impact: Provides direct food assistance and promotes dignity and empowerment through access to healthy food in their specific service area (Androscoggin, Cumberland, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, and Waldo counties). Their school and satellite pantries are particularly impactful in reducing barriers to access.

Relevance to our mission: A strong local community service provider that directly helps those in need in the Midcoast area.

Maine Veterans Homes:

Focus: Provides compassionate long-term care, rehabilitative and therapy services, and skilled nursing care for honorably discharged veterans and their families at six locations across Maine (Augusta, Bangor, Caribou, Machias, Scarborough, and South Paris).

Impact: Offers essential care and support to aging or injured veterans and their spouses, ensuring they receive the dignity and respect they deserve. They play a crucial role in the state's healthcare system for veterans.

Relevance to our mission: Similar to the Travis Mills Foundation, this supports those who have served and contributes significantly to the well-being of the veteran community in Maine.

2) Model Train Hobby/Train Organizations

Recommended Recipients:

Scout Troops involved in Train Badge achievements:

This is a perfect fit. Donating here directly supports youth development within our communities while specifically fostering an interest in trains through a structured program. It's an investment in the next generation of enthusiasts.

Seashore Trolley Museum:

This museum does exemplary work in preserving an important part of transportation history. By supporting them, we're not only helping maintain a significant cultural and educational attraction for Maine but also directly promoting interest in rail transport through their active collection and public programs.

Wiscasset and Farmington Railway Museum:

Like the Seashore Trolley Museum, this organization is dedicated to preserving a unique narrow-gauge railway heritage. Their efforts provide educational opportunities, attract visitors, and contribute to the local economy, all while celebrating a distinct aspect of train history.

Downeast Scenic Railroad:

Operating a scenic railroad provides a unique community asset. It offers educational experiences about rail travel, draws tourism to the region (benefiting local businesses), and keeps the spirit of train travel alive and accessible to the public.

One of the local Train Clubs (e.g., Southern Maine Model Railroad Club, Great Falls Model Railroad Club, or Eastern Maine Model Railroad Club):

These clubs are the grassroots foundation of the model train hobby. They often host public open houses, teach skills, and provide a welcoming community for enthusiasts of all ages. Supporting a local club directly strengthens the hobby's presence and engagement within its respective community. I suggest the board consider rotating support among them or selecting one based on their current community outreach efforts.

New England Steam Co. or NESCO

Current owners of the Maine Central #470 Steam Locomotive. They are in the process of restoring the engine to operating status. The 470 is the last steam powered locomotive to pull a passenger consist in Maine.

While retiring in Maine, Treva was very active in the local garden club while Tony pursued his passion for model trains. The couple were both very helpful to the Maine 3 Railers. Treva served as

newsletter coordinator and Tony manning many train displays. Some of the activities which they had a big hand in were the Christmas display at the Maine State Museum, the Candy Cane Train in Bath, and visits to the Bath Library and the Plant Seniors Home in Bath. Together, they helped Doug Pollock with the White Elephant table at the M3R train shows. For several Holidays Tony, Fred Guth, and Jeff Jacobs held open houses followed by a festive dinner at Maxwell's in Bath, organized by Tony & Treva.







 We had a multi-car derailment. Several cars uncoupled and derailed when hit in the rear by the pulling locomotive. Operators can be easily distracted by the crowd but must watch for car separations and address multiple occurrences of the same car uncoupling.





We added twenty extra feet of Lionel FasTrack to the layout at the last minute because the VAMC provided five 6 foot long tables instead of the expected 5 foot tables. Four of these were substituted on the long straight section in the middle of the layout in place of planned 5 foot tables. This change seemed minor but the ripples in design and implementation expanded.

Sam gages the amount of track we bring for a layout based on the original design. He takes some extra but 20 feet of straight track stretched his load. At the end we ran out of 30" straight track and scrounged for shorter pieces to fill the gap on the trolley line.

Last year on the fly we ackwardly placed the control table in the middle of the layout because the power cables were too short to reach the planned end of the layout. Since then Sam lengthened the

cables and we again placed the control table on the end with all the power track located in the middle of the layout next to the bridges. Unfortunately, the additional four feet of tables placed the power terminal tracks four feet away from the control table exceeding the cable lengths. Last minute, we moved the power terminals from the left of the bridges to the right which gave us the additional length necaessary to connect with the transformers. The transition was completed just in time for Sam to power up the engines for our 10 o'clock start time.

Notes of Interest:

- Our location outside of the Patriots Canteen had both pluses and minuses. The aisle limited the width of the layout but allowed for long straight runs in the center. Many patients, staff, and visitors pass this area daily. This increases the opportunity for folks to stop and visit.
- At the last minute we scratched placing over half of the planned buildings and provided power to only the carnival rides and a few select buildings. On many of our visits we have only two hours to set up and be ready to run trains by 10 am. Transporting our equipment from outside Bldg. 205 to Bldg. 204 as well as the redesign necessary to compensate for the change in tables detracted from fulfilling our full plan.





Editor's Note: April and May 2025 were busy months for Doug and our Mobile Outreach Team with three funerals, four events in April, and three more in May. Doug finally caught his breath and recovered below.

April, what a month with four great model train shows! I covered the Southern Maine Model Railroad Club Spring Train Show last month. This month I will cover the rest:

Thomas Memorial Library:
